

Stephanie Morton was born and raised in York, South Carolina. She is the fourth of five children, three brothers and one sister. She attended Jefferson Elementary school until the sixth grade. In 1968 her street was selected to integrate York Elementary school. I guess you can say, she played a part of the civil rights era. That was the most difficult year of her educational life, but taught her the importance of a good education.

She attended North Carolina Central University, in Durham, North Carolina, and graduated in 1979 with a Bachelor of Science in Education. She was awarded a full scholarship to attend Miami University in Oxford, Ohio graduating with a Master's Degree in Education in 1980.

She accepted a job as a middle school teacher with the Cincinnati Public Schools district. After working for a few years, she realized that she wanted to move into education administration. She began to take courses at Xavier University and eventually earned her elementary and secondary administrator certifications. She was married in 1984 and has two lovely adult daughters.

Stephanie then applied and was awarded a full scholarship into a doctoral program at the University Of Cincinnati. She again took classes as she worked and earned her Doctor of Education degree in 1986.

She has spent 36 years with Cincinnati Public Schools (CPS) as a teacher, assistant principal and principal. She retired from CPS in 2013 and accepted a position as superintendent of the Cincinnati State STEM Academy charter school for two and a half years.

After taking six months off, she decided to again work for CPS as a sub administrator. Filling in for administrators as they are off for medical leave is never dull as she learns how different schools operate in different ways. She is learning so much and also has the flexibility to travel in between her assignments.

She has been very active in Crossroads Church, a lifetime member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority since 1980, a member of Nia Book Club, and a member of Delta Kappa Gamma. She enjoys traveling, reading, bike riding and learning new things.
