December Feature Member Jane Orth



My entry into a career as an educator did not follow the typical route. After graduating from high school, I attended Xavier University and majored in business earning a B.S.B.A. – Industrial Relations, summa cum laude, degree.

My first career led me to NCR in Dayton, OH, where I was a personnel generalist with a variety of responsibilities including hiring, compensation and benefits, training, and the role of personnel liaison with the regional and district sales managers. I loved my role in training, but it was only a small chunk of my job. I became burned out on what I refer to as the "corporate rate race and busting my behind putting in long hours to help a corporation generate a profit". I wanted something I felt had greater meaning and purpose.

In my mid-thirties I decided to change careers and was accepted into the charter class of Xavier University's Occupational Therapy program. Being that it was the first OT program in the region, the make-up of students was unique; 28 of 34 of us were career changers already having

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a bachelor's or master's degree in a different field of study and related work experience. Due to a condition in which classmates were unable to obtain student loans for a second bachelor's level program, the dean of the education department provided an option in which we could also take graduate level education courses and earn a Master of Education – Administration degree. Although I earned the M.Ed. while completing the occupational therapy program, I had no thoughts of working in education; then I had what some would call a twist of fate, but what I refer to as God's plan for my life. Since OT was a developing program that would not be certified until a certain percentage of my class passed the National Occupational Therapy Certification Exam, the department chair determined our fieldwork placements (similar to student teaching) would be in the two classic domains of OT: Physical disabilities and Psychosocial disabilities. I completed the first placement and was supposed to go to a facility in Reno, NV, for the second, but in the eleventh hour the Reno placement fell through. Our fieldwork coordinator had to scramble to find an alternate placement and looked to other settings, ultimately resulting in my fieldwork placement in school-based occupational therapy at Lakota Local Schools. If not for that experience, I probably never would have considered working in the school-setting.

Fast forward, I passed the OT certification exam and accepted a position with Hamilton County Educational Service Center. I have been with HCESC for 23 years, most of which was spent in the Northwest school district and more recently the Winton Woods school district. During this time I have worked with students across the grade range from preschool through high school with my first love being preschool. Remote learning during the pandemic has been especially challenging and frustrating with the preschool population because so much of what I do is hands-on.

Outside of school I enjoy outdoor activities (hiking, kayaking, bicycling, and tending to my perennial garden), church activities, playing with my dogs, and Xavier basketball . . . Go Muskies! I reside in Middletown with my 88 year-old mom and two canines, both of which (the dogs, not my mom) are rescues. The photo of me is pre-COVID, therefore unmasked, with Maizey the corndog.
