## A "Past Programs" Update

A few years ago, I introduced Roger Grein, founder of Magnified Giving, who spoke to us at a DKG meeting (it was at the Firehouse Grill, I think). Because I wrote him a thank you note following the meeting, I am now on the Magnified Giving mailing list.

You may remember that Magnified Giving is an organization that teaches young people about philanthropy. Many schools in Greater Cincinnati now participate in the philanthropy education provided by Magnified Giving. Adults, organizations and foundations contribute to Magnified Giving and the various school groups decide on the awarding of grants from the fund after they research non-profit organizations in our area.

This year, 6 different school groups (All Saints Middle School, the GIVE program, Good Shepherd Montessori Middle School, Indian Hill High School, Moeller High School, Springer Middle School) independently chose La Soupe (our May, 2018 program) to be the recipient of their Magnified Giving grant. "Normally, most non-profits receive one grant from one school during this program, but La Soupe won a total of 6 grants from 6 different schools, totaling \$7,185.

"This money will go towards purchasing the containers that the food goes out in and will sponsor approximately 20,000 healthy meals for our food insecure neighbors." (Magnified Giving Year-End Report)

When I read this, I thought it interesting that two of our recent DKG programs came to be linked in this way.
