
Membership Recognition

As long as I can remember, I always wanted to be a teacher. I loved books and remember begging my mom to teach me how to read and how to write letters. However, back then we were not suppose to learn those things before we began kindergarten. After I started school I played a lot of "school" with pretend students.

I was born in Cincinnati. When I was in third grade my family moved to Glenview, Illinois. This was the first of many moves because the company my father worked for transferred him frequently. We lived in Dallas, Texas; Shreveport, Louisiana; Aurora, Illinois; and Spokane, Washington. With each move my family learned about different areas of the country. When I was in college my family moved back to Cincinnati and I graduated from the University of Dayton. I received a teaching degree for K-8 with a minor in special education.

While living in Colorado I had 3 children and was divorced. In 1990, I married my second husband and moved back to Cincinnati. I began work with Princeton in February, 1991 as an aide. The following fall I was hired as a LD teacher at Woodlawn. Then I was transferred to Lincoln Heights where

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I taught second grade for several years and also went back to being an Intervention Specialist. I retired 9 years ago from Stewart Elementary. I joined DKG in 1998. The meetings allow me to continue to share a love of learning with other teachers and make new friends. My husband and I enjoy traveling to different parts of the world as well as in our own country. I volunteer doing Healing Touch at Bethesda North and my church. I also do yoga, love to take walks, garden and of course read books. I feel fortunate to have such a wonderful life.

To the women of DKG,

In the year since you awarded me a generous scholarship, I have had an amazing college freshman experience. I thoroughly enjoyed living on campus in the newest dorm, Marian Spencer Hall. It also featured a healthy option dining hall on the first floor, one of the perks about living there. My favorite classes have included Introduction to Poetry, Biology at the Cincinnati Zoo, and a history class taught focused around the musical Hamilton.

In addition to my regular academics, I am heavily involved with my primary scholarship program, the Darwin T. Turner Scholars. This diverse group of high-achieving and supportive students and staff have become a sort of family to me. At our end-of-the-year ceremony, I was awarded the Highest GPA medal in my Turner Freshman cohort for earning a 4.0 my first semester. When I'm not studying, I can usually be found outside or at a coffee shop with friends. I enjoyed participating in fun events on campus like CRU (a Christian campus ministry) on Wednesday evenings and salsa classes on Thursday nights.

I am thrilled to announce that I will be an undergraduate researcher at the University of Cincinnati this summer. I am working with Dr. Thomas Moore, professor of political science, as well as a team of fellow University Honors students. Our project is entitled "Understanding International Relations in an Era of Globalized Economic Activity" and we will be focusing on international economic relations, changes in the global corporate landscape, and the geopolitical implications of a globalizing world economy. Using proprietary data purchased from Forbes, I look forward to helping create original databases in which the world's top 2,000 companies are organized by industry and nationality to track changes over time in the prominence of, among others, American, Chinese, Japanese, German, South Korean, Brazilian, and Indian companies in industries ranging from pharmaceuticals and computers to telecommunications and automobiles. To compile this information, I will be using Bloomberg Professional to access more detailed, real-time, and company-specific data.

In the fall, I will be an Ambassador and Mentor for the Turner Scholars, a peer leader/TA for an incoming section of Honors Students, and on the Executive Board of Student Government as the Co-Director of Outreach & Recruitment.
